Beach Life in the Slow Lane

As many of you know, I am a caregiver licensed in the state of Washington. I have been doing some form of caregiving off and on for the last 32 years. I have done this in my home, other people's homes, and an adult family home. I protect the privacy of my clients and don't discuss them; but I have noticed a common thread of those that I have worked for that have had strokes. This isn't true for everyone but it is more common than not. When someone has aphasia (has trouble speaking or can't speak at all), they can often swear profusely. They can curse a blue streak with perfect enunciation. Even sweet old church ladies who have never used profanity can say things that will curl your hair. Also, some people who can no longer speak after a stroke can sometimes sing. I was contemplating this common thread the other day (yes I know, I need to get out more) and decided to research why this is so.

I don't think anybody really knows for sure, but researchers agree that cursing and singing are commonalities of those who struggle with aphasia post stroke. The best that I can dig up is that cursing is automatic speech. Speech that can be said without thinking. Curse words are emotionally driven words causing them to pop out. I remember one summer at Bible camp a religious speaker who happened to be a farmer told us teens that you don't just say "ouch!" when a cow steps on your foot; that sometimes other words pop out. One time in my teens, I was in a parking lot with my mother who didn't know any bad words and out of nowhere I was shot by a BB. The king of all bad words escaped out of my mouth, in front of my mother no less! I remember that I did not get in trouble, probably because I was doubled over in pain. My mother acted as if she hadn't heard and has no memory of the incident to this day. Those must be examples of automatic speech.

Automatic speech is stored in a different part of the brain and is accessed more readily and triggered more easily, even when other speech functions are impaired. As for singing-- music and singing are usually located in the right hemisphere of the brain and speech in the left. When music is heard, it activates more than just speech. Singing can be relatively untouched after a stroke. It all depends on which side has been affected by the stroke. There is even a choir made up of people with aphasia. So keep all of this in mind if your dear loved one has a stroke and starts using some salty language or breaks out in song.

For those of you wondering about my candy making endeavors, I will catch you up. I ordered supplies to make suckers. I have molds, sticks, plastic bags, and twist ties. I successfully made orange suckers. My great niece and I thought they needed a little more flavoring but my son, grandson, and husband thought they were perfect. Next I tried to make spearmint suckers. I couldn't get them to harden. I had done everything correctly so I decided that the humidity must have been too high. I ended up freezing them and they froze well. It was the only way I could get them out of the molds. They quickly liquified. I did try a couple. I think I put too much flavoring in. It was like sucking on a Halls cough drop. I am rarely home anymore and can't plan for perfect humidity right now but I haven't given up.

Most of my time now is spent working, eating, sleeping, and taking care of my husband. If you do happen to see me out and about, make sure you say hi. Until then, Stay Tuned!

Growing up in the 50's! And Then Some!

My family lived in southeast Portland when I was growing up...My father had had an unhappy life growing up, and vowed he would give his family a stable life when he could...After the war, he stayed in occupied Japan for a while, and wanted to go into the hotel business there. He ran that idea past my mom, and she nixed that right away. So he headed home...My brother and I lived with mom's family while dad was away, but as soon at he came home, he looked for a forever home for himself and the family. They found a little craftsman home in southeast Portland, and the family settled in. (That home stayed in the family for 30+ years.)

My dad returned to college, and mom worked as a secretary to support the family. As I got older, we had a wonderful Italian lady who took care of us kids. She just lived a few doors away from us, and we loved her! I started school at Marysville School in our neighborhood. And Maria took care of my brother and me until mom got home from work, and dad got home from school. My brother and I still remember Maria making Italian food for the family...Lasagna was made on the kitchen table, and she treated us as her own grandchildren! Maria stayed with the family until both of us kids were in school, and we had to become "latch key" kids until mom and dad got home from work.

After dad got his degree, he became a teacher at Benson High School. Mom continued to work, eventually becoming the secretary for the Forest Service administrator for the northwest region....a great job she loved! Every afternoon after school, I was to call her at her office, and to ask for a certain extension. Mom was always glad to hear my voice, and always asked how my day had gone at school....She learned to drive at that time as my dad became ill

and spent several weeks in the hospital. My brother and I both remember some scary rides with her as she was learning to drive, the car had a stick shift, and there were many hills between our home and the hospital! But mom was determined to visit dad in the hospital!

Our neighborhood was full of families with kids, lucky for us...Next door was a family with four girls, all older than us kids...and they had a piano! One of the older girls tried to teach me to play, but I could never get the hang of it! And the parents of those girls scared me. On the other side of our house was a household of foster kids, the dad in the family was a minister at a nearby church. We ended up friends with two of the foster boys, built a fort in an old chicken coop, and dug in the dirt....Across the street lived several families with kids, so we learned to ride bikes, only as far as Holgate, the street just to the north of our block. The boys on the block never won a bike race down 73rd street if I was in the race!

In the summer, all the kids stayed outside until it started to get dark. When the porch lights went on, we all headed home, and watched TV until bedtime. While my dad considered himself an "in control" parent, we really had the run of the neighborhood. Dad had been raised by a semi-absent mother, so he had no idea about keeping tabs on his kids...Luckily for us, 73rd street was full of parents raising kids, so everyone watched out for all the kids. But we all had lots of freedom in the neighborhood, everyone watching out for all of us!



History of New Year's Resolutions

The <u>ancient Babylonians</u> are said to have been the first people to make New

Year's resolutions, some 4,000 years ago. They were also the first to hold recorded celebrations in honor of the new year—though for them the year began not in January but in mid-March, when the crops were planted.

A similar practice occurred in ancient Rome, after the reform-minded emperor Julius Caesar tinkered with the calendar and established January 1 as the beginning of the new year circa 46 B.C. Named for Janus, the two-faced god whose spirit inhabited doorways and arches, January had special significance for the Romans. Believing that Janus symbolically looked backwards into the previous year and ahead into the future, the Romans offered sacrifices to the deity and made promises of good conduct for the coming year.

Despite the tradition's religious roots, New Year's resolutions today are a mostly secular practice. Instead of making promises to the gods, most people make resolutions only to themselves, and focus purely on selfimprovement (which may explain why such resolutions seem so hard to follow through on). According to recent research, while as many as 45 percent of Americans say they usually make New Year's resolutions, only 8 percent are successful in achieving their goals. But that dismal record probably won't stop people from making resolutions anytime soon—after all, we've had about 4,000 years of practice.
